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#### 1.0 Context

Established as part of the COVID-19 Response and Recovery Fund, the Jobs for Nature (JFN) Programme is administered across DOC, Ministry for the Environment, Land Information NZ, Ministry of Primary Industries, and Ministry of Business Innovation and Employment.

The programme was always intended to be a time limited response to COVID-19, and sustainability of outcomes was part of the selection criteria. We encourage partners to continue planning and looking for opportunities to sustain outcomes for their projects.

There is no additional funding for Jobs for Nature projects. DOC's approach to project transition is to support projects to lead their own transition through:

- Direct engagement with project partners to understand transition requirements
- Baseline support
- Facilitating connections to resources and pathways where they come available

Projects have existing relationships with local DOC staff who manage funding agreements and provide additional support. These staff have local knowledge to provide more bespoke support and connections for individual projects. They are engaging with projects to understand their transition requirements and help build transition plans.
